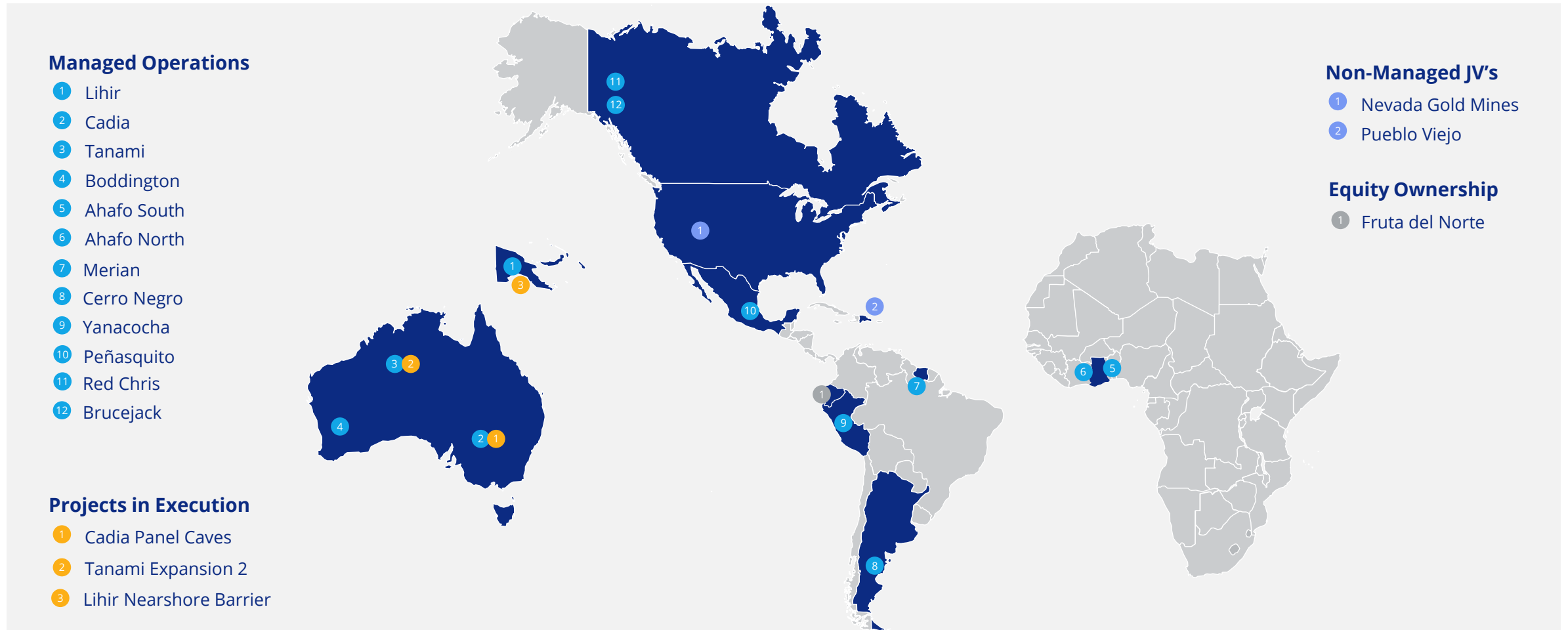

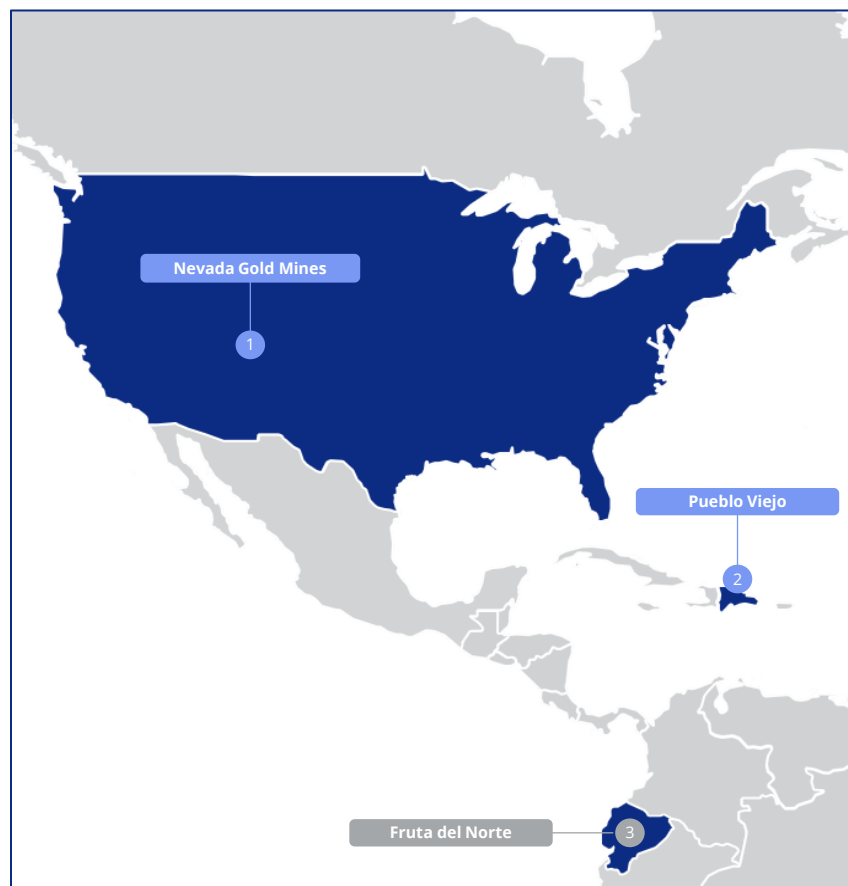

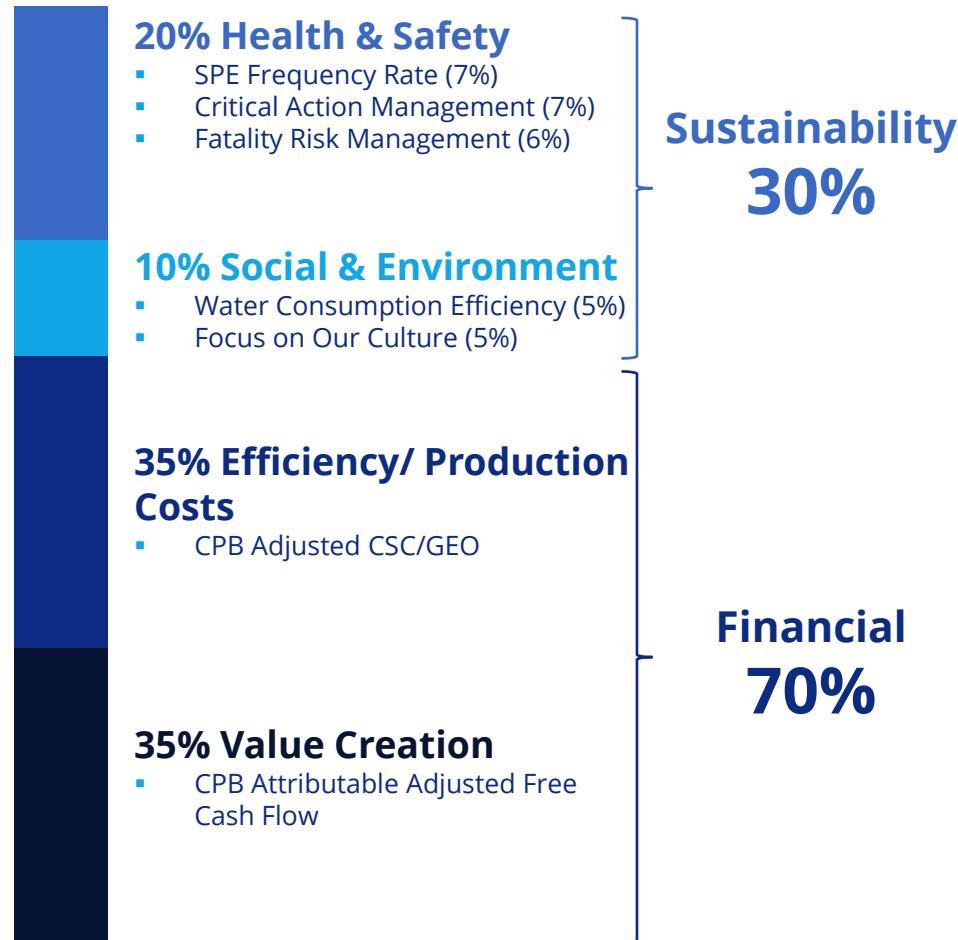

Disciplined, sustainable returns through the commodity and investment cycles

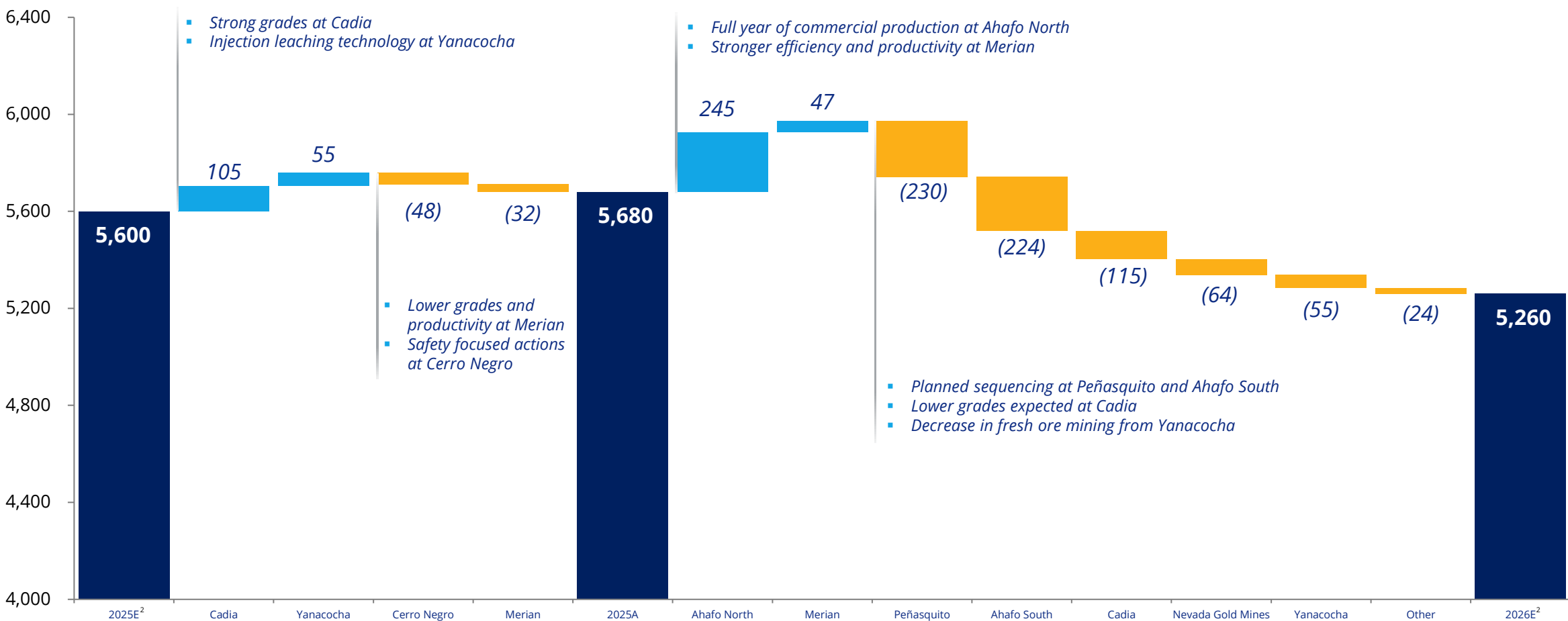

Attributable Gold Production From Core Portfolio (Koz)¹

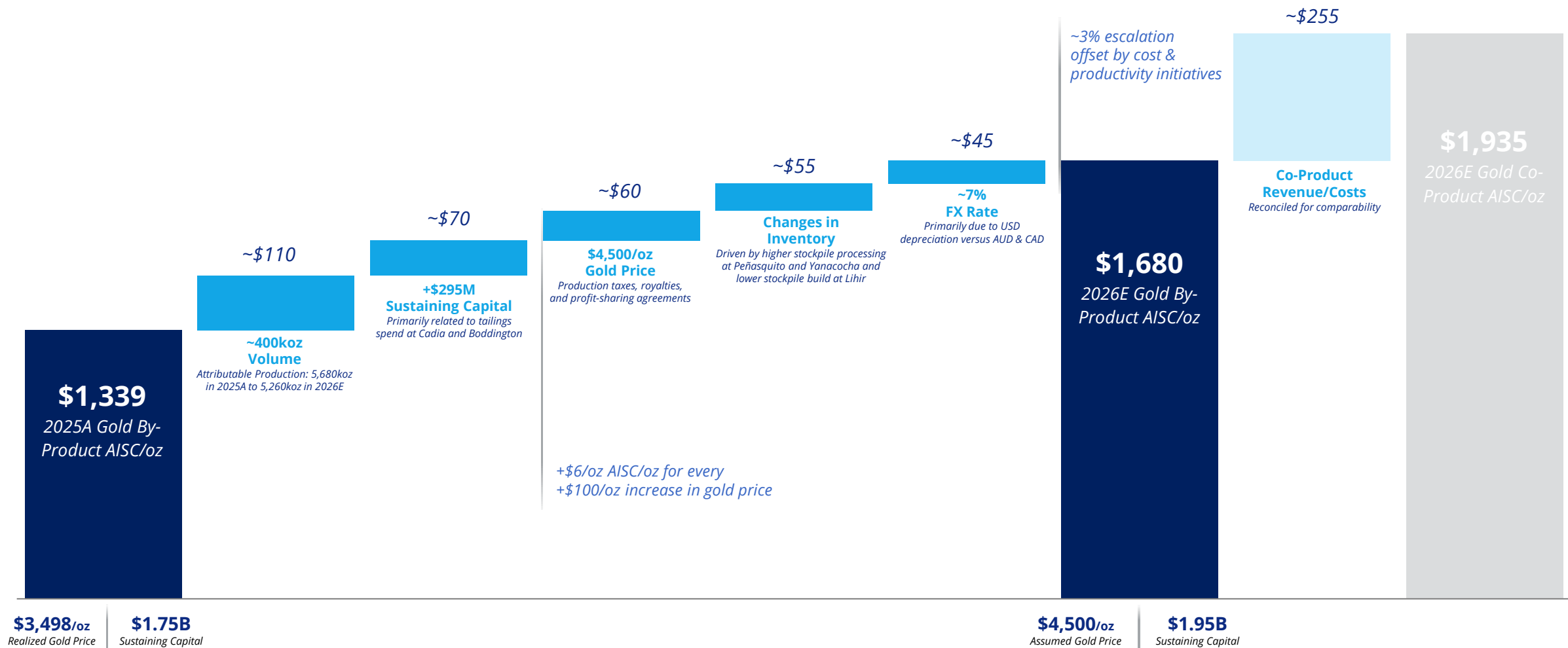

Gold All-in Sustaining Costs (AISC) from Core Portfolio (\$/oz)¹

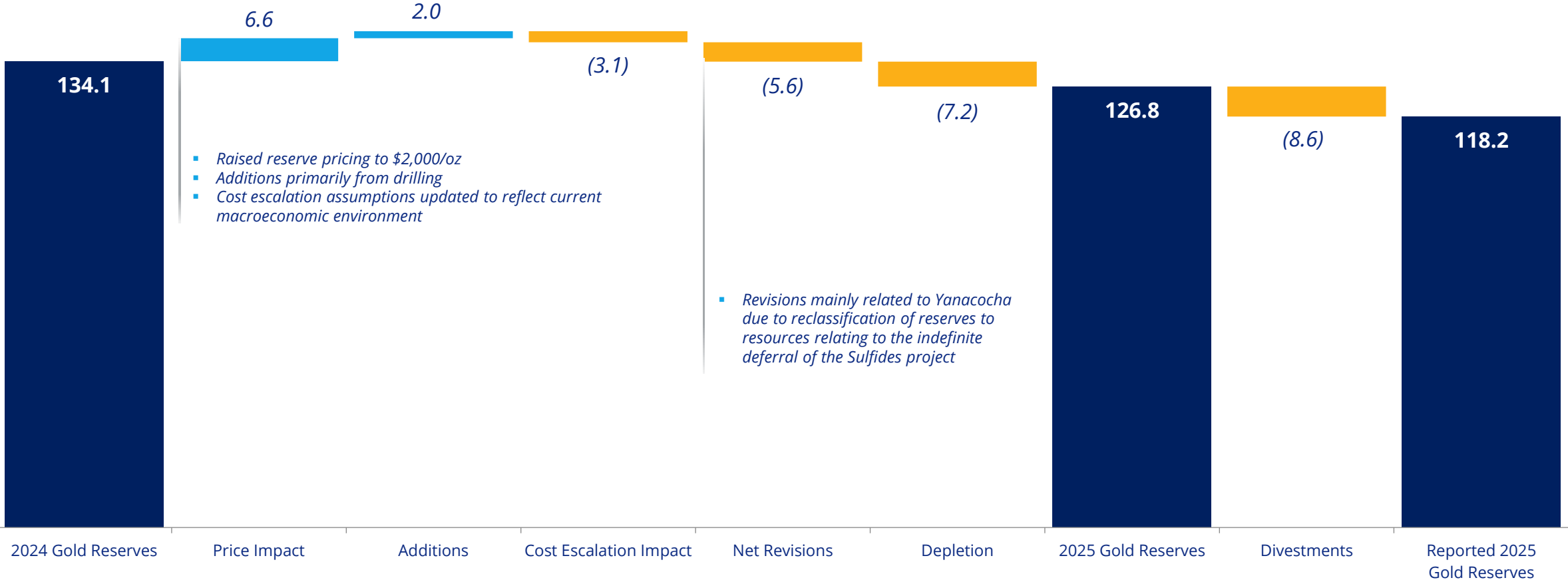

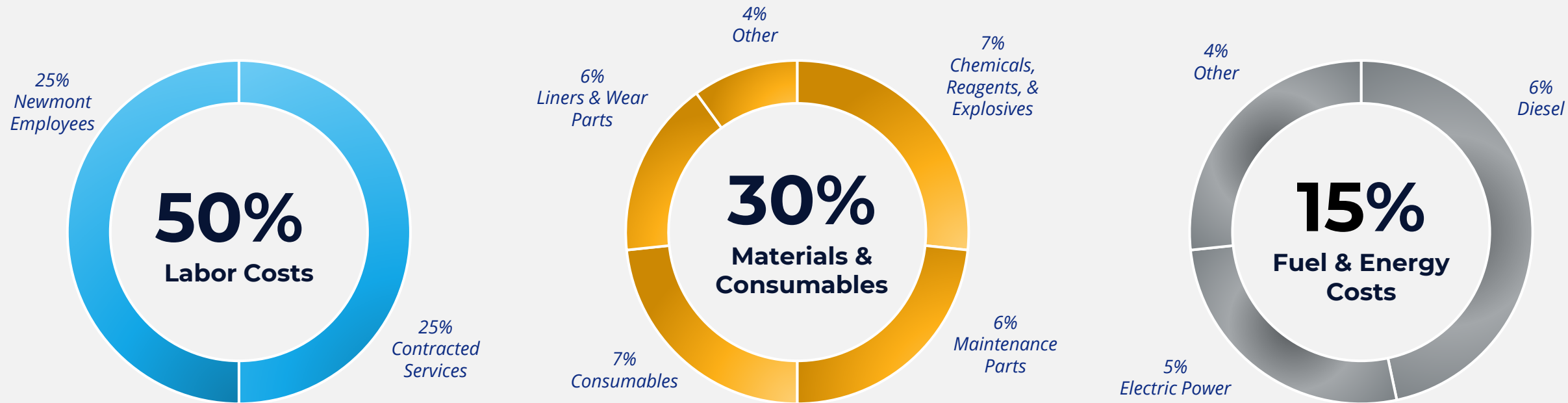
